CERT TRAINING AVAILABLE

Wellsville City is joining with the Cache County Sheriff's Office and the Cache County Emergency Response Team (CERT) Council to offer an 8-week course for people interested in learning how to take care of themselves, their families, and their communities in an emergency.

There is no fee for the course, however training material and supplies (Manual, ID card, instruction materials, and basic CERT kit) will cost approximately \$50.00. Wellsville City will reimburse city residents who successfully complete this course (requires attending all 8 classes and the simulated emergency). Ages: 18 years and older.

Class size is limited.

In addition to the weekly training, the course ends on November 19, 2011 with a simulated emergency held at the Logan City Fire Department Training Tower. This will give participants an opportunity to put their training to use.

Everyone in the community would benefit in receiving this training. CERT Training provides important information and skills for people of all ages and physical capabilities. The Mayor and City Council encourage you to give consideration in attending these valuable classes.

STORMWATER

This fall, let your leaves work for you. Leaving your yard waste on your lawn is :

- Good for your landscape. Grass clippings and fallen leaves are truly a valuable natural resource. Grass clippings left on the lawn can provide up to 25% of your lawn's total fertilizer needs and leaves contain 50 to 80 % of the nutrients a plant extracts from the soil and air during this season. To keep these nutrients where they can nourish your lawn, mulch grass clippings and leaves and leave them on the lawn, or compost them.
- Good for your wallet. By leaving grass clippings and leaves on your lawn, you are supplying it with natural fertilizers, which means you spend less money on store-bought fertilizers. To keep your yard waste from clogging storm drains and being washed into waterways: Remove yard waste from street, sidewalks, and driveways. Use your leaf blower or broom or sweep grass clippings or leaves into the yard. Don't bag grass clippings and fallen leaves; use it as mulch.
